

About This Week's Program



Virginia Tech men's basketball coach Mike Young has named Kevin Giltner assistant coach in July. He replaces Antwon Jackson whose departure for a job at East Carolina left a spot open on the staff.

Giltner is a 2012 Wofford graduate who lettered for four years under Young's tutelage. During his time as a player he helped lead the Terriers to back-to-back conference titles and NCAA Tournament appearances in 2010 and 2011. As a senior point guard, he averaged 14.8 points, 4.2 rebounds, 1.8 assists, and nearly a steal per game en route to All-Southern Conference Honors.

After a brief stint playing professionally in Iceland, Giltner joined Young's staff as Director of Basketball Operations for the 2013-14 season. He was then promoted to assistant coach and spent five seasons primarily working with the backcourt during a run of tremendous success for the

program.

The VT program is clearly still in the building process, but it would appear that Mike Young has cleared a significant hurdle by replacing one promising young assistant coach with yet another.

Here is a list of some of the more commonly used ones and their meanings. These you should know!

AG: Area or Assistant Governor. Each area has one. Area 9 AG is Cora Gnegy of the Giles County Rotary Club.

COG: Council of Governors. This is an advisory group made up of past District Governors.

COL: Council on Legislation. They meet every 3 years to look at resolutions presented by the clubs, so they make the rules.

CTT: Club Team Training. A training session for club officers and club committee chairs but anyone can attend.

DDF: District Designated Fund. These funds represent 50% of the district's contributions to the Rotary Foundation from three years ago. They keep rolling!

DG: District Governor, the top leader in the district. This year's DG is Nancy Whitlock, RC of Waynesboro. **DGE: District Governor-Elect**. The DGE will be the district governor next year. Our DGE is Tara McCall Ellis from the Bristol, VA-TN club.

DGN: District Governor-Nominee will be the DG in two years, so waiting in the wings is our DGN Kathy Kanter from the Strasburg club.

DTTS: District Team Training Seminar, a training for district leadership, AGs, and committee chairs. **EREY: Every Rotarian Every Year.** This means that each club member donates at least \$25 a year to the Rotary Foundation.

GSE: Group Study Exchange, a program now funded by the district, sending a group of young professionals to another district to study their profession.

IPDG: Immediate Past District Governor. Tim Carter's year is over, but his influence remains.

MOP: Manual of Procedures. This is the rule book.

PE: President-Elect. "I'm up next year...learning what to do" says T.J. Anthony.

PETS: Presidents-Elect Training Seminar. President's school.

PHS: Paul Harris Society. A member obligates a \$1,000 donation to the Rotary Foundation each year.

PN: President-Nominee. "I still have two years to learn and I'm cramming" says Ken D'Amato.

PP: Past President. "I'm done!" says Mike Snyder.

PHF: Paul Harris Fellow. Once your total donations to the Rotary Foundation equals \$1,000, you are eligible to be made a Paul Harris Fellow.

RC: Rotary Club, as in the RC of Blacksburg.

RI: Rotary International. Duh!

RID: Rotary International Director.

RIP: Not what it looks like! Rotary International President.

RLI: Rotary Leadership Institute, Rotary School.

RYE: Rotary Youth Exchange.

RYLA: Rotary Youth Leadership Awards, a training weekend for high school juniors and seniors.

THF: The Rotary Foundation.


In a letter every Rotarian received this week, he says, in part, "Last year, we launched our five-year Action Plan to build a stronger future for Rotary. We are

Rotary announces a 7th Area of Focus: Supporting the Environment




The Rotary Foundation Trustees and Rotary International Board of Directors have both unanimously approved adding a new area of focus: supporting the environment.

More than \$18 million in Foundation global grant funding has been allocated to environment-related projects over the past five years. Creating a distinct area of focus to support the environment will give Rotary members even more ways to bring about positive change in the world and increase our impact.

Immediate Past President Mark Maloney

says that during his travels around the world as a Rotary senior leader he encountered many Rotary members and Rotaractors who advocated for the environment to be an area of focus. It joins the other six areas of Focus: Peace and Conflict Resolution, Disease Prevention and Treatment, Water and Sanitation, Maternal and Child Health, Basic Education and Literacy, Economic and Community Development.
